Decorating Guide

Apple



Food Marker

1. Use a food marker along with either your projector or paper templates to mark guides on your cookie.
(More details in the video)



Red PIPING

2. Pipe a line along the bottom edge of the apple slice.



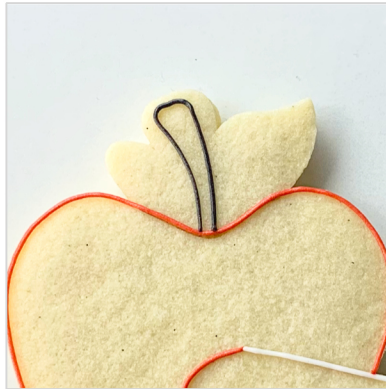
White PIPING

3. Pipe a line along the top edge of the apple slice.



Red PIPING

4. Pipe an outline around the main apple shape.



Dark Gray PIPING

5. Outline a shape for the stem that's narrow at the bottom and bulbous at the top.



Pale Blue PIPING

6. Pipe an outline for a curvy leaf that starts at the stem & ends at the top right point.



Pale Blue PIPING

7. Pipe a similar, but slightly smaller, leaf emerging from the left side of the stem.



Assorted PIPING

8. Using coordinating colors for each section, pipe the crater-preventing squiggles shown above.



Dark Gray FLOOD

9. Fill in the stem, using your scribe to pull icing to the edges.

Apple (cont.)



White FLOOD

10. Fill in the middle of the apple slice.



Tan PIPING

11. With the white icing still wet, pipe two half-heart shapes along the top edge of the slice, one inside the other.



Pale Blue FLOOD

12. Fill in each leaf, using your scribe to pull icing into each sharp point.



13. Allow your icing to dry or, at a minimum, crust over.



Red FLOOD

14. Fill in the main apple shape, using your scribe to clean up the edge around the slice.



15. Allow your icing to dry or, at a minimum, crust over.



Red PIPING

16. Outline the bottom edge of the slice to give it a little more definition.



Dark Gray PIPING

17. Pressure-pipe a tear drop shape to create a seed in your slice.



Green PIPING

18. Starting near the stem, pipe a gently curved line about 3/4 of the way up each leaf.

Pale Blue PIPING

19. Pipe a few small decorative dashes in the top left corner of the apple.

Thermos



Food Marker

1. Use a food marker along with either your projector or paper templates to mark the lid line on your cookie.
(More details in the video)



Pale Blue PIPING

2. Pipe a line along the bottom lid line. Complete the shape by piping around the top edge of the cookie.



Green PIPING

3. Pipe lines along the bottom edges of the cookie to outline the base of the thermos.



Pale Blue FLOOD

4. Fill in the lid, using your scribe to pull icing to the edges.



5. Allow your icing to dry or, at a minimum, crust over.



Green FLOOD

6. Fill in the base of the thermos. Work quickly since you'll be doing some wet-on-wet work.



White FLOOD

7. With the green icing still wet, pipe two small ovals in the locations shown.



Scribe

8. Place your scribe in the middle of an oval and pull the icing upward to a point. Repeat this motion down, left and right. Also repeat with the second oval. (More details in the video)



White PIPING

9. Still working quickly (since you want your base icing to still be wet), pipe vertical lines above and below each star.

Thermos (cont.)



Dark Gray PIPING

10. With your base icing still wet, pipe a series of curved lines, similar to what's shown. Or feel free to make your own pattern of lines.



11. Allow your icing to dry or, at a minimum, crust over.



Pale Blue PIPING

12. Pipe a curved line along the bottom edge of the lid.



Pale Blue PIPING

13. Pipe a second curved line above the first, starting and ending where the lid angles.



Tan PIPING

14. Pipe the outline of a slanted rectangle with the upper corner near the lid.



Tan PIPING

15. Pipe a small circle inside the rectangle, near the top corner.



Tan PIPING

16. Pipe some squiggly lines inside the rectangle to help minimize cratering of your flood icing.



Tan FLOOD

17. Fill in the rectangle, excluding the circle. Use your scribe to pull icing into the corners.



18. Allow the tag to dry completely (several hours if possible).

Thermos (cont.)



Yellow PIPING

19. Pipe a line from the left side of the tag's hole to the right edge of the lid. Then pipe a line from the left side of the lid to the left edge of the tag. You can add a knot or bow as well if you'd like.



Food Marker

20. Making sure the tag is fully dried, write a message on it with your edible ink food marker.

Basket



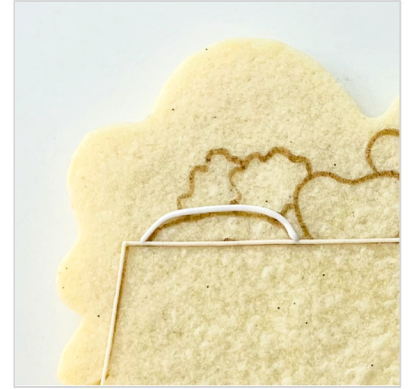
Food Marker

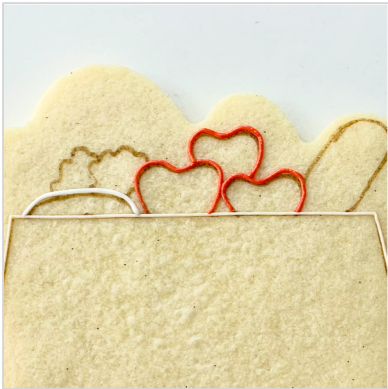
Tan PIPING

2. Pipe an outline around the basket.



White PIPING

3. Pipe a line over the guide for the top portion of the napkin.



Red PIPING

4. Pipe outlines for each of the three apples.



Yellow PIPING

5. Pipe an outline around the loaf of bread.



Yellow PIPING

6. Pipe both an outer and inner loop for the right handle.



Yellow PIPING

7. Repeat for the left handle.



Tan FLOOD

8. Fill in the basket.



9. Allow time to dry completely.

Basket (cont.)



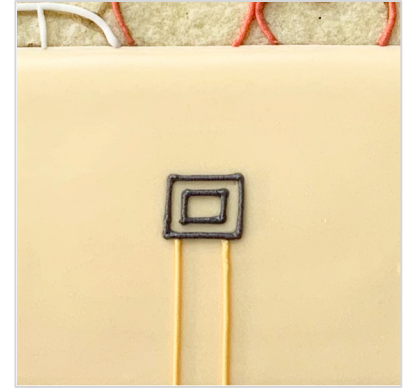
White PIPING

10. Pipe two small angled lines inside the napkin section, as shown.



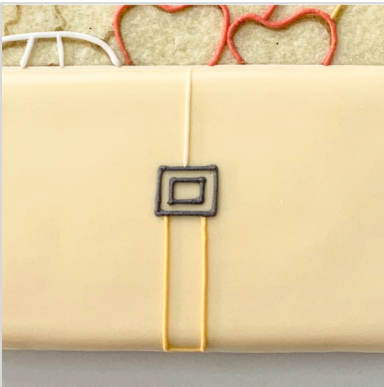
Yellow PIPING

11. Pipe lines for the left, right and bottom borders of the strap.



Dark Gray PIPING

12. Pipe two small rectangles, one inside the other, to create the buckle.



Tan PIPING

13. Pipe a line from the top-middle of the buckle to the top edge of the basket.



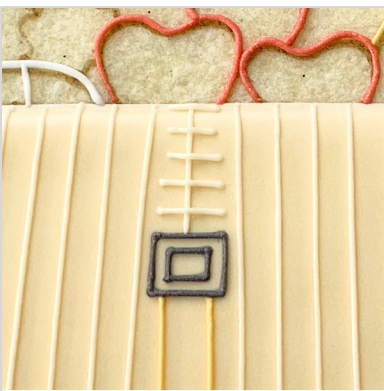
Tan PIPING

14. Estimate the mid-points between the buckle and the basket sides and pipe vertical lines in those locations.



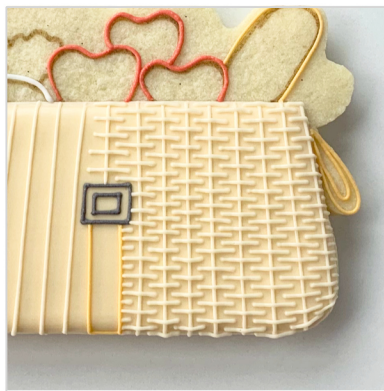
Tan PIPING

15. Keep sub-dividing your vertical lines, piping new lines at each midpoint until you have roughly 17 total vertical lines.



Tan PIPING

16. Pipe a series of horizontal, evenly-spaced lines on top of the middle vertical line. Each line should begin and end near (but not touching) the adjacent lines.



Tan PIPING

17. Pipe similar horizontal lines along the length of each vertical line, offsetting these lines for each new column you pipe. Work from the middle outward to one edge. (More details in video)



Tan PIPING

18. Repeat this piping pattern on the other side of the basket, again working in columns and moving outward from the center.

Basket (cont.)



Assorted PIPING

19. To help prevent cratering, pipe squiggles of coordinating color inside each of the sections shown.



White PIPING

20. Pipe a shape similar to that shown for the middle of the napkin. At the top, your lines will be piped directly over the existing lines.



White PIPING

21. Pipe outlines for the left and right sides of the napkin, again piping over the existing lines at the top.



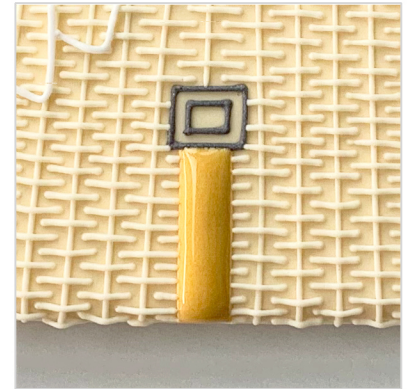
Yellow PIPING

22. Pressure-pipe the left and (tiny) right flowers, settling the icing with your scribe if needed.



Yellow PIPING

23. Fill in each handle, settling this thicker icing with your scribe.



Yellow FLOOD

24. Fill in the strap.



Yellow and Tan FLOOD

25. With the yellow flood, pipe a thin strip of icing along the bottom and right edge of the bread loaf. Immediately fill in the rest of the loaf with tan icing.



Yellow PIPING

26. Pipe three thin, curved lines in the middle of the still wet icing of the bread loaf.



Red FLOOD

27. Fill in the top apple, using your scribe to pull icing to the edges.

Basket (cont.)



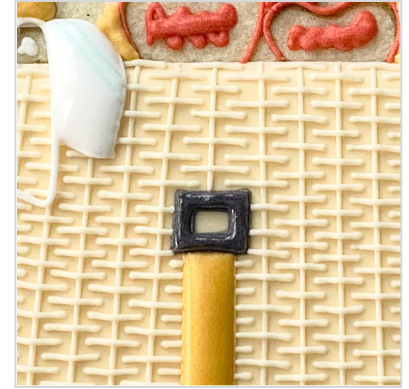
White FLOOD

28. Fill in the left and right sides of the napkin.



Pale Blue PIPING

29. Pipe a pair of thin lines in each of the still wet napkin sections (as shown).



Dark Gray PIPING

30. Fill in the buckle, settling this thicker icing with your scribe.



Yellow PIPING

31. Pressure-pipe the middle flower, settling it with your scribe as needed.



White FLOOD

32. Fill in the middle section of the napkin.



Pale Blue PIPING

33. Pipe a pair of thin lines in the still wet napkin (as shown).



Red FLOOD

34. Fill in the two remaining apples.



35. Allow your icing to dry or, at a minimum, crust over.



Dark Gray PIPING

36. Pipe stems for each apple, plus one additional stem in the space below the apples.

Basket (cont.)



Dark Gray PIPING

37. Pipe three curved lines above the basket to create branches.



Dark Gray PIPING

38. Pipe a few straight stems in the top left of the cookie. Pipe many smaller branches off the main stems.



Pale Blue PIPING

39. Pressure-pipe sets of leaves emerging from each apple stem. (More details in video)



Pale Blue PIPING

40. Pressure-pipe dots of varying size at the ends and along the length of the straight branches.



Green PIPING

41. Pressure-pipe leaves along the curved branches. (More details in video)



Yellow PIPING

42. Pipe petal lines on each flower. They can be very loose, uneven & organic.



"Warm Brown" Gel & Water

43. Mix one drop of brown gel with a few drops of water & paint over the handles and strap to give a leather look. (More details in video)



"Warm Brown" Gel & Water

44. Add a few more drops of water to your paint mixture and paint some texture and shading on the bread loaf. (More details in video)
